Hebrews—Jesus Is Superior

Hebrews 12:1-4 Hold Fast, Look to Jesus

STUDY 2 (For Sermon on 26 Oct 2025)

Hebrews 12:18-29 Hold Fast, Come in Awe

Background

- Hebrews' author is unknown, likely a second-generation leader after the apostles (2:3)
- Recipients were not mentioned. They were likely Jewish, persecuted and discriminated against for their faith (10:32–34)
- Returning to Judaism, a legal religion in Rome, would spare them from persecution.
- Hence its warnings not to fall away (2:1-4; 3:12-4:13; 5:11-6:12; 10:26-39; 12:25-29)
- Instead, it's a call to **hold fast** to their faith in Jesus (3:6, 14; 4:14; 6:18; 10:23).
- It's likely a sermon in written form, described as a "word of exhortation" in 13:22. "Exhort" appears four times (3:13; 10:25; 13:19, 22) and "exhortation" three times (6:18; 12:5; 13:22)
- It was possibly written before the temple's destruction in AD 70. 12:4 could suggest a date before Nero martyred the Christians after Rome's great fire.
- It is laden with OT thoughts: "Thirty-five quotations from a Greek translation of the Old Testament and thirty-four allusions work to support the development of Hebrews' argument. In addition, the writer offers nineteen summaries of Old Testament material, and thirteen times he mentions an Old Testament name or topic, often without reference to a specific context."
- To help the readers step back and see God's sovereign hand amid their sufferings.

Message

- Hebrews is also a "word of exhortation" because God is a speaking God.
- His voice is "living and active" (4:12).
- Today if we hear His voice, we must pay heed (3:15).
- As long as it is called 'today', we must "exhort one another" (3:13)
- To listen to God's voice in His Son is to read OT in light of its fulfilment in Jesus Christ (1:1-2).
- Otherwise, to revert to OT sacrifices and rituals would deny Christ.
- Given the temptation to return to Judaism, the writer reminds his persecuted readers of the faith of OT saints, their leaders, and the pattern in Jesus' life—suffering comes before glory.
- Its already-not-yet end-time perspective implies the reward promised, the heavenly city, still awaits the believers.
- The theological truths in Hebrews thus serve as the foundation to exhort believers not to fall away.
- The greatness of Christ and His work makes falling away foolish.
- Its call is to hold fast to Christ, the superior mediator of a better covenant.

How to Read the Book of Hebrews in its Old Testament Context

A. Look for Promises Fulfilled in Jesus.

- 1. Jesus as the true Son of David—He is the Messiah, the kingdom OT promised is realised in Him. (1:2 // Ps 2:8, 1:5 // Ps 2:7, 2 Sam 7:14.)
- 2. Ps 110: 1, "Sit at My right hand until I make Your enemies Your footstool.' "fulfilled in Jesus Christ (See 1:2, 13; 8:1; 10:12–13; 12:2).
- 3. Jesus as the Great High Priest "sat down at the right hand of the throne of the Majesty in the heavens" (8:1; See Ps 110:4, "... 'Forever, You are a priest like Melchizedek.")
- 4. Jesus as the Greater Moses and Joshua
 - a. Covenant Fulfilment of Jer 31:31-34 in 8:8-12, 10:15-18; Jesus as the Greater Moses
 - b. Land-Rest Fulfilment of Gen 12:1-3 in 3:12-4:13, Jesus as the Greater Joshua

B. Look for OT Events, Institutions, and Persons (Typology) Anticipating Jesus and Heavenly/Eternal Realities.

- 1. The fulfilment is always greater than the type
- 2. In OT, God spoke through Israel His Son (Ex 4:22; Jer 31:9). Now, God has spoken finally and definitively in His Greater Son (1:1-2)
- **3.** Jesus is pre-eminently the better king, priest, and prophet, bringing a better sacrifice, covenant, rest, and promise.
- **4.** Warnings of earthly penalties for disobeying OT Laws anticipate eternal judgment for rejecting eternal salvation in Jesus (2:2-3)
- 5. Earthly priests and the tabernacle are copies of the heavenly ones (8:5, 9:11).
- **6.** The blood of bulls and goats anticipates Christ's sacrifice through the eternal Spirit (9:12-14, 23-24).
- 7. Believers are earthly exiles, looking to a heavenly home (11:13-16)

C. Look for End-Time Perspective—Already but Not Yet

- 1. "We do not yet see everything subjected to" Jesus (2:8)
- 2. The present heavens will perish and be rolled up like a cloak (1:11-12).
- 3. The created things, the present heavens and earth, will be shaken and removed, and only God's kingdom will remain (12:26–28).
- 4. Jesus will appear a second time for those awaiting salvation (9:8)
- 5. Believers are perfected in holiness for all time by Christ's one offering (10:14)
 - a. Yet, for now, they must persevere in faith amid suffering (10:39-11:40).
 - b. They must pursue holiness without which no one will see the Lord (12:4)
 - c. They're members of the heavenly assembly (12:22-33)
 - d. They seek the city to come (13:14).

Hebrews 12:1-4

Read the text throughout the week(s) before your group time.

Therefore, since we are surrounded by such a great cloud of | *Notes and Questions* witnesses, let us throw off everything that hinders and the sin that so easily entangles. And let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us, ² fixing our eves on Jesus, the pioneer and perfecter of faith. For the joy set before him he endured the cross, scorning its shame, and sat down at the right hand of the throne of God. ³ Consider him who endured such opposition from sinners, so that you will not grow weary and lose heart.

⁴ In your struggle against sin, you have not yet resisted to the point of shedding your blood.

GROUP: STUDY 1

Recap: Hebrews 1 begins with God's son as His final word. The Son is the creator and sustainer of the universe, the eternal kingly priest who, after making purification for sin, sat down at God's right hand.

Hence, Hebrews 2-5 calls us not to neglect or fall away from so great a salvation.

Hebrews 6-10 shows Jesus as the perfect sacrifice and priestly king who inaugurated the new covenant, transforming God's people through the law inscribed on their hearts.

Thus, Hebrews 10 calls believers to faith and action—let us draw near, let us hold fast, and let us consider how to stir up one another in love and good deeds. With the judgment to come, believers were called to a persevering faith that holds fast to Jesus.

Immediate Context of Hebrews 12

Persevering faith, Hebrews 11 explains, is the result of trusting God for the unseen eternal rewards based on His word. It's a faith awaiting the glory to be revealed at Christ's return, which far outweighs the sufferings in this life. This faith is highly esteemed by God. It pleases Him. It's an essential instrument of salvation in Christ.

Hebrews 12 further shows us that this faith is anchored in who God is, in His severity and kindness, revealed in His judgment and promises in Christ. This faith will enable believers to finish well in the race marked out for them.

Read Hebrews 12:1-4

Comments

Remember Lot's wife in Gen. 19:26! She looked back longingly to the city of Sodom and Gomorrah and was turned into a pillar of salt.

Remember also Heb. 10:38-39, "but my righteous one shall live by faith, and if he shrinks back, my soul has no pleasure in him.' But we are not of those who shrink back and are destroyed, but of those who have faith and preserve their souls."

The athlete imagery in v.1 reminds us that the Christian race is a call to

discipline, focus, simplicity, and perseverance.

It's a call to recalibrate our hopes and expectations, to re-examine our desires and ambitions in this life, by looking to Jesus' past example, present exaltation, and coming glory.

It's a call to forego even good things which are unnecessary to the race and the glory of God.

It's a call to resist the allure of temptations, however and whatever they look, feel, taste, promise and offer.

It's a call to deny self, to take up the cross and crucify our selfserving, selfpreserving, selfexalting, and self-indulging tendencies.

It's a call to discipleship, to live like Jesus,

¹⁸ You have not come to a mountain that can be touched and that is burning with fire; to darkness, gloom and storm; ¹⁹ to a trumpet blast or to such a voice speaking words that those who heard it begged that no further word be spoken to them, ²⁰ because they could not bear what was commanded: "If even an animal touches the mountain, it must be stoned to death." ^{n 21} The sight was so terrifying that Moses said, "I am trembling with fear." ^o

²² But you have come to Mount Zion, to the city of the living God, the heavenly Jerusalem. You have come to thousands upon thousands of angels in joyful assembly, ²³ to the church of the firstborn, whose names are written in heaven. You have come to God, the Judge of all, to the spirits of the righteous made perfect, ²⁴ to Jesus the mediator of a new covenant, and to the sprinkled blood that speaks a better word than the blood of Abel.

²⁵ See to it that you do not refuse him who speaks. If they did not escape when they refused him who warned them on earth, how much less will we, if we turn away from him who warns us from heaven? ²⁶ At that time his voice shook the earth, but now he has promised, "Once more I will shake not only the earth but also the heavens." ^f ²⁷ The words "once more" indicate the removing of what can be shaken—that is, created things—so that what cannot be shaken may remain.

²⁸Therefore, since we are receiving a kingdom that cannot be shaken, let us be thankful, and so worship God acceptably with reverence and awe, ²⁹ for our "God is a consuming fire."

The immediate context

Hebrew 12:5-17

While Christian life is a race, God does not just leave us to it. He is at work moulding us into Christlikeness because He loves us. He allows suffering not to punish but to discipline and train us in holiness of heart. So, let us not lose heart when we're disciplined. It proves we are truly His. For without holiness, no one will see the Lord (v.14). Avoid Esau's complacency. He traded his inheritance for short-term gratification.

Read Hebrews 12:18-29

Isa. 33:14 "Who of us can dwell with the consuming fire? Who of us can dwell with everlasting burning?" Points to God's terrifying judgment on sin

Mal. 3:2 "For he will be like a refiner's fire..."

 The latter two sets of verses describe God's judgment on sin and God's purifying work on His people

Comments

The race believers are running will bring them into God's eternal presence forevermore.

What is this presence like? Why did saints of old look forward to it so much? They would forsake earthly wealth and enjoyment, to endure sufferings to enter this celestial city, when all that these OT saints (illustrated in Heb. 11) had known was only the old covenant at Mt Sinai.

This is because Heb. 12 shows Mt Sinai is only a faint shadow of the heavenly Mt Zion, which is far superior. Like the old covenant that Mt Sinai represents, it serves only as a sign pointing to the new. Heb. 12 gives us a glimpse of the blessedness of this heavenly city. How encouraging it is that the race believers are called to finish on earth will lead to it!

So, for believers with eyes of faith, this race is sustained by the reality of this heavenly blessedness. And believers' habitual assembly to worship, encourage and spur one another to love and good deeds (Heb. 10:24-25) is a foretaste of being in the blessed presence of God and His people.

This means the same joy that sustained Jesus as He endured the cross and now sits at God's right hand, that joy is available to believers now. Through faith, believers can now experience the heavenly worship of Mt Zion in the presence of angels and the cloud of witnesses who had completed their race.

Heb. 12:23 includes them in "the assembly of the firstborn enrolled in heaven." They belong to the company of Abraham's spiritual offspring, who, like Abraham, are looking forward to the celestial city with eyes of faith. (Noted that the firstborn in v.23 is a reference to Christ. See Heb.1:6. See also how Heb. 2:10-11 parallels Rom 8:29 that Jesus might be the
